You are the light of the world, and God has chosen you to be the light to your homeland. Believe and declare this. The reason for your boldness in any circumstance is because of your identity as this "light."




The Dream Painters



When I draw scenes from my hometown, I try to capture them as they were, so I recall childhood memories I had forgotten. I miss my friends and relatives in those moments."

My dream is to become a webtoon artist, and I want to draw scenes of going to church with my friends in North Korea after unification.



The artists of Heavenly Dream School envision a gospel-centered unification and pray for the land of North Korea and the families left behind. 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Hello, my name is Pastor Eunhee Kim, and I serve at Heavenly Dream School. These days, the students simply call me "teach." Spending long hours together at school and in the dorm seems to have brought us closer.

I still remember the first day I met the students of Heavenly Dream. It was back in 2006, just before graduating from seminary, when I was going through missions training. Every time I passed by a run-down missionary center in Garak, Songpa, I would see unfamiliar-looking children. They were small in stature but had piercing eyes—later I learned they were North Korean defector students. Back then, they were just passing faces, but in 2010, by God's guidance, my ministry at Heavenly Dream School began.

My life and ministry themes have always been discipleship and missional living. When I first started, I was full of spiritual ambition: "I'll raise them well, help them change, raise up workers of the gospel..." I knew it wouldn't be easy, but I soon realized that sharing the gospel rarely goes according to one's expectations.

I teach a one-hour Bible class each week for all grade levels. One day, I was sharing the message of heaven, and I said, "If you believe in Jesus, there's heaven beyond death." Immediately, a male student harshly interrupted, "Don't talk about death so lightly!" For this student, who had barely escaped death, death wasn't a hope—it was something terrifying. In the early days of ministry, I often felt angry at this kind of defiance. It took a long time to begin truly understanding them. We made mistakes, went through trial and error, but I never stopped. Bit by bit, I continued to sow seeds of faith.









At the **dorm**, I devoted myself to share the gospel through daily life. As one household, the dorm community holds weekly family worship. I still remember the students singing praises in their uniquely bold and booming North Korean voices, casting off their worries as they worshiped. One day, we were having a lively conversation in the dorm when a student suddenly called out, "Teach! Teach!" Without warning, the student pulled me into their room and handed me a phone, asking me to share the gospel with their aunt. She had been trying to evangelize to their aunt, who lives in China, and called me in when they felt stuck. In truth, when speaking with someone in China, we are careful not to use overtly Christian language—it's a basic rule. But I proclaimed the Word of God in faith, and her aunt quietly listened to it all. After the short call ended, I looked at the student and felt a deep gratitude—grateful to see faith taking root in their heart.

I also recall going to "Dawn Prayer for Unification" with a student who had just escaped North Korea and arrived in South Korea. For this student, everything—church, God, Christianity—was entirely new. Yet during the entire prayer meeting, she wept uncontrollably. After the service, I gently asked what had moved her to tears. She replied, "I was so thankful to see so many South Koreans praying even at dawn for unification and for the people of North Korea." From that day on, this student became a beloved child of God, preparing for gospel-centered reunification through prayer.



There is always a spiritual battle in every moment of sharing the gospel. When I see students putting up walls in front of God's Word, there are times when I wonder, "Is it not working?" and feel like giving up. But then, the students leave a small opening for the Word to enter. Even if they show the slightest change in their willingness to listen, I feel an indescribable joy. Though the progress may be slow, I know the seeds I have sown will surely grow, and that is why I cannot stop sharing the gospel.

Every year at the start of the semester, we hold a "Leadership Camp" for the students. Since the faith camp touches the spiritual lives of the students, I always feel a heavy burden as the one in charge. However, when these students, who are still learning Korean, are able to freely praise and worship God, I think about how delighted God must be in seeing them. At the same time, countless souls in North Korea come to mind. I pray that the day will come quickly when the light of the gospel will shine into their dark lives. And so, even today, I continue to stay by the side of the students entrusted to me, moving forward.





The gospel is lived out each day at Heavenly Dream School. The students shine brightly in the Lord. On the day of gospel-centered unification, I long to hear the joyful laughter of these beautiful students overflowing like *flowers* blooming across the land of North Korea.





Family Dorm, I-HOUSE

Faith camps, one-on-one discipleship, worship the gospel is sown into every scene at Heavenly Dream School. Each student's journey of faith begins at a different time, but many graduates confess that it was when they felt the love of their teachers that they began to want to know God. Dormitory teachers, in particular, share God's love through their everyday lives. Heavenly Dream School operates nine home-style dormitories, each with one teacher living together with 4 to 6 students.

The nine teachers serving in these dormitories have willingly laid down a life of comfort to care for the souls entrusted to them. Among them is a teacher from Georgia, USA, who answered the call to this mission. Holly first came to Heavenly Dream School in 2023 as a member of a U.S. volunteer team. During her visit, she experienced life in the dormitory alongside the students. Deeply moved by the lives of North Korean defector students, Holly returned this year as one of Heavenly Dream School's new dormitory teachers.













Holly lives in the I-HOUSE (International House), which is specially managed and operated. At first, the students felt some pressure about living with a foreign teacher, but they've now grown quite accustomed to communicating in a mix of Korean, English, and Chinese. In fact, many of their peers envy them for the natural opportunity to learn English in everyday life. More than anything, they are realizing—often for the first time—that there are people, both in Korea and around the world, who truly value and love them as North Korean defectors.

Holly's ministry extends far beyond the dormitory. She also serves as a native English teacher at Heavenly Dream School, teaching both current students and alumni. Additionally, she offers English classes outside regular working hours to help strengthen the language skills of the faculty. With prior experience teaching students in the U.S., she brings high-quality instructions that greatly benefits the entire Heavenly Dream community. We pray that God's abundant blessings would overflow in Holly's life as she walks this path of ministry, and that through her footsteps—now spreading across the globe—many more will be moved to pray for the people of North Korea and for gospelcentered unification.

"I-House is a slightly special dormitory. Here, Korean, English, and Chinese flow naturally it feels like a small world of its own. At first, everything felt unfamiliar and awkward. We couldn't communicate well, and our cultures were different. so we looked at each other with caution.

But as we spent time praying, eating, and even cleaning together, our hearts gradually opened. In the evenings, we read the Bible in our own languages and share conversations. Because we're different, we're even more special—and we can connect on a deeper level. Inside this small dorm, a learning greater than academics is taking place."

The Sense of Life

Graduate Chungsong Shim

18th Graduating Class of Heavenly Dream School Senior in Soongshil University Computer Science Major

What was your life like ten years ago?

Those days are marked by memories of survival and hardship. I was firstborn in an ordinary family in a small farming village in Ryanggang Province. Before I even learned how to read, I was pulling weeds in the fields and raising livestock. We moved to the city to escape poverty, but no matter how hard we worked, our lives never improved. We often had to rely on half-frozen potatoes roasted over fire just to get by, and eventually, we had no choice but to return to the countryside. In a hopeless situation, my father fled North Korea first for the sake of his two sons' future. Three years later, my mother attempted to follow him but was caught by the State Security and spent three years in prison. Barely into my teenage years, the weight of becoming the head of the household fell heavily. Later, when it came time to enlist in the military, I was denied the opportunity because of my father's defection. Survival became a daily battle. Longing for a life with dignity, I made the decision to cross the Amnok River with my mother.

On a pitch-black night, all my senses came alive the moment I stepped into the ice-cold water, my body trembling from the freezing temperature and fear. When we were halfway across the river, I looked back and could barely see the North side fading in the distance. I felt a deep sorrow as my past disappeared before my eyes, and the fear of death swept over me, but at the same time, an intense yearning for a new life surrounded me. I was allowed only a brief moment relief in knowing we had made it across the river alive.

Almost as if they had been waiting for us, the Chinese police seized us. They covered our heads with black cloths, and when an electric baton struck the back of my neck, I lost consciousness. I was locked inside a cold prison cell built specifically for North Korean defectors. "Why was I born in that cursed land of North Korea, living as if I'm not a human being..."



The odds of successfully escaping North Korea and making it all the way to South Korea aren't quite like winning the lottery—but they are incredibly slim. Once I was captured and imprisoned in China, I had no choice but to wait for the inevitable: repatriation to North Korea.

One person in my cell took their own life. From far away, we would hear animal-like cries that echoed throughout the facility. Everyone who came in was sent back to North Korea within a week. There were no windows. I tried to track time by the faint movement of light, guessing the hours. One day. Two days. A week... No one came for me, and my anxiety grew worse with each passing day. The prison walls were carved with countless marks—traces of those who had passed through. One day, I noticed three crosses etched into the wall. A scene from a foreign drama I had secretly watched in North Korea suddenly came to mind. There, in that cold, lightless cell, I knelt before the crosses and said my first-ever prayer: "If You save me from this pit of death, I will live my life for You as my Savior..."

On the evening of the 89th day, thanks to my father's desperate efforts and what I can only describe as divine intervention, my mother and I were released from prison. "We're taking you to the Republic of Korea." Those were the words of the South Korean diplomat—and I was too stunned to believe it. We arrived at Yanji Airport, and I still remember the wave of emotion that hit me as I boarded the plane to South Korea. It remains the happiest day of my life.

"While wandering in the world, I did not know the Lord..." That was the hymn we sang during a worship service at the NIS. As soon as I heard it, tears streamed down my face. I thought about all those years I had wandered in darkness in North Korea, not knowing Jesus, and the grace that had led me all the way here. That day, I accepted God as my Savior.

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I entered Heavenly Dream School with the desire to pour new wine into new wineskins. I came to continue the education I couldn't complete in North Korea, but everything felt unfamiliar, and I felt incredibly small. Still, I held on to the belief that God was with me, and with that faith, I faced my challenges and began to grow, little by little.

It was here that I was finally able to embrace the word "dream" in my heart. Every moment I spend working toward becoming a software developer—doing what I love with computers—brings me great joy. Though I'm still a university student, I'm determined to grow, graduate, and become someone of value, so that I can be recognized in South Korean society and one day pass on this knowledge and skill to my homeland.











God chose and rescued me from crisis, and placed people of faith around me. In walking with Him, I have found my true identity. Sharing this love and grace with my homeland is both my calling and destiny. Because I know the pain the people of North Korea live with, I cannot remain silent. The desperate prayer I once cried out for myself in prison has now become a prayer for that land—North Korea.

Please pray with me that *countless souls may receive freedom and the gospel*, and that the day will soon come when *I can finally reunite with my dearly missed younger brother.*
